As a person with lived experience harm reduction has always been close to my heart, my journey through employment began with volunteering at Birmingham DAAT in 2003 leading on my projects there from a service user involvement perspective. In 2008 I became employed through BDAAT and managed the volunteer and harm reduction training programs delivered to services across Birmingham. I joined inclusion in 2010 working in the Newly commissioned Park House detox and rehab centre I worked there for 5 years as the admissions manager then in 2015 when the contract changed hands I moved to another Inclusion service at HMP Birmingham as a recover practitioner. All through my career I have kept harm reduction at the core of my practice and have lead on many projects in each service I have worked for including being the naloxone lead at each of them, representing them at local

naloxone-harm reduction steering groups. As a person who has lived with Hepatitis C and successfully completing treatment myself, the Hep C agenda has always been of interest to me, so when the opportunity came to join the Hep CU Later team I was over the moon to be part of the collaborative effort to make history by eliminating the Hepatitis C virus in the UK by 2025 and globally by 2030

Recent conferences



The London Voint Working Group Conference (written by Deanne Burch)

The London Joint Working Group (LJWG) held their annual conference in June to present and discuss the extensive work they are doing around Hepatitis C and the Hep C U Later team were lucky enough to attend.

A very thought provoking presentation was delivered on needle and syringe provision, accessibility, stigma and choice and there was a great example of Hackney delivering holistic harm reduction interventions for under-served groups. Dee Cunniffe also spoke about their vision for peer based needle exchange. My reflection from this was whether we have an opportunity as services 'open-up' again post covid to re-design the needle and syringe services we are delivering with an approach that embodies co-production and reduces health inequalities.

Another key highlight of the LJWG conference was the update from Ian Jackson and Ashley Brown on the expansion of opt-out HIV testing in emergency department to include Hepatitis B and C and how this is being rolled out across London. Werner Leber and Specioza Nabiteeko also spoke about enhance GP case finding in primary care and how this can find people with hepatitis C. This work is essential to find people with blood-borne viruses who otherwise might not have been tested elsewhere.

Professor Godffrey Dusheiko gave an oversight of the global progress toward hepatitis C elimination, with Monica Desai showing England's data perspective and what the areas of focus might need to be in the future. Both Graham Foster and Mark-Gillyon-Powell from NHSE's HCV Programme spoke of the incredible progress that has been made and the key actions over the next few years to reach hepatitis C micro-elimination across the country. Stuart Smith presented on the Hepatitis C Trust's report 'Reframing Reinfections' and Steve Taylor delivered some key information about the recently published drug strategy. There were a number of peers who delivered a talk on their experience of having hepatitis C and becoming a peer. These are the talks that remind us of why we are all here and why this work is so important. As a person with lived experience and having played an active part in furthering the harm reduction agenda I have always attended the national DDN conference. It's an event where once a year we can come together under one roof, from all corners of the UK, service users and professionals alike. This year I attended with a new hat (I have worn many over the years) as a member of the Hep C U Later team, it was great to speak to the many different people regarding the work that Hep C U Later are doing at the moment. I spent a good deal of time connecting with Hepatitis C Trust coordinators and peers from all over the UK regarding the great work they are doing in the effort to micro-eliminate Hep C nationally.

It's always a great pleasure to connect with Philippe Bonnet harm reduction activist for 20 years and the peer coordinator for Hep C Trust (Birmingham and West Midlands) and discuss plans for joint hep C training events we can provide for drug and alcohol services in our area. The highlight of my day was getting to spend some time with Dr Judith Yates, Dr Yates has been at the heart of drug treatment and harm reduction in Birmingham for 40 years. In later years Dr Yates and myself became colleagues and worked at the same service for Inclusion. Though Judith has retired from her role as a GP with Special Interest in Addictions, she has continued to give her time as a harm reduction activist in the arenas of drug related deaths, Hep C treatment and Naloxone provision both local and nationally.

DDN Conference continued

A Peer worker from the Hepatitis C Trust gave an excellent presentation about the importance of making testing for hep C core work in drug and alcohol services, reinforcing the importance of testing for every client entering treatment, re-testing when relevant and the importance of peer involvement from the Hepatitis C trust with the aim of sharing the burden. With the message "leave no one behind".

Finally, I spoke to someone who had recently experienced some quite extreme discrimination in a healthcare setting due to his Hep C status even though he has cleared the virus through treatment, this proves that ignorance around BBV transmission is still happening to people today. We as harm reductionists need to keep health related stigma high on our agenda as we know stigma kills.

What is clear from the conference is that for many hepatitis C is still very high on the agenda.
